

NOTE: If the top right hand stamp is folded in the creases, it is apparent how the 'A' came to be in the margin. Fortunately, as the grease-proof backing paper is available and can therefore be aligned with the creases on the stamps, it can be appreciated as to how severely the missing stamps were creased. It is highly probable that they were so badly damaged that either the Printer or the Post Office disposed of them prior to issue.

It is also of interest that the two stamps with missing letters, have also had their respective cancellation bars extended by hand with a similar instrument to that used on the 10/- value for the controversial 'Third Line Obliteration'. (The similarity can be further appreciated if the respective cancellation bars are viewed from an angle in a strong light).

### WHY SO MANY POOR QUALITY OVERPRINTS AND DAMAGED STAMPS ?

STUDY NOTES

In late August 1967 the Biafran Forces made a big counter-attack in the Mid West Region, advancing to about 40 miles from the Federal capital of Lagos. The timing (The start of the Rainy Season) took the Federal Forces completely by surprise.

The Banks and Post Offices were high on the list of priority objectives and the sum of £4 million is estimated to have been seized within 1 hour of arriving in BENIN.

The Biafran troops with careless handling, bad transportation and in torrential rain, damaged numerous sheets of stamps en-route to Port Harcourt (*Where the overprinting was carried out*). As a result, sheets of stamps sticking together had damaged gum and much surface damage; These were sometimes overprinted over the damage. In addition some sheets were overprinted with creases present, resulting in some unusual varieties.

OVERPRINTED ON TOP OF SURFACE DAMAGE



Surface Damage on 2 Right Hand stamps probably caused by sheets of stamps sticking together due to tropical humidity, or slight exposure to rain during transit.

#### OVERPRINTED OVER HORIZONTAL CREASE



The bottom stamp of this marginal pair shows extensive distortion of the Coat of Arms and to the'B' in BIAFRA, due to a Horizontal Crease being present at the time of the overprinting process. OVERPRINTED OVER DIAGONAL CREASES

The bottom 2 stamps of this block of 4 show extensive distortion of the overprints, due to Diagonal Creases being present during the overprinting process.

#### OVERPRINTED OVER VERTICAL CREASES



A gap on the Left Hand side of the 'Coat of Arms' due to a big Vertical Crease being present at the time of overprinting.

The incorrect 'setting-up' of the overprinting block has resulted in some apparent variation of the 1968 date on many of the stamps. They can be read as 1358, 1368, 1938, 1958, 1963, 1965 etc. (The correct date should read 1968).



Variety caused by the overprinting being carried out whilst diagonal folds were present in the sheet of stamps being overprinted.

The Bottom stamp in the vertical strip of three is normal apart from the overprint being slightly lower than is usual.

The Top and Middle stamps have got diagonal gaps across sections of their respective Coats of Arms.

In addition the Middle stamp shows distortion to the 'B' and 'I' in 'BIAFRA'. There is also a diagonal gap and variation of alignment in the two cancellation bars that obliterate the word 'NIGERIA'.
